CareGiver Spotlight: Caring and Sharing

ot is 81 years old and lives in Manchester with her daughter. Two year's ago, Dot's daughter contacted The CareGivers looking for a volunteer to provide some companionship for her mother who is alone all day. Long-time CareGiver volunteer, Joannie, was looking for a friendly visit assignment at that time – a perfect match! A wonderful friendship has formed between these two women.

Joannie sees Dot at least once a week and they usually talk over coffee and a "goodie". The pair will go out occasionally if Dot is up for it. When the women are together, they are never at a loss for conversation. Dot enjoys doing puzzles and playing cards, but when Joannie visits "we just get talking and have so much to say, we never get to doing anything else" Dot

explains. She goes on to say, "Joannie is very special to me; she is such a good, close friend. We have a lot of fun and she makes me laugh a lot." Joannie's sentiments about Dot are much the same, "Dot is a sweetheart with a great sense of humor. I consider her a really, really good friend." Despite her medical issues, Joannie says Dot is always fun and never complains. She is so appreciative and never has a bad thing to say about anyone.

Even though Joannie is busy with her own life, she always makes time to visit or call Dot. "Visiting Dot is not a chore", says Joannie. "I look forward to going every week. I would go every day if I could because I love our time together so much". If Joannie has to miss a visit, she makes a point of calling just to check in on Dot.

Dot can't say enough about Joannie; "she let's me talk things

out when I have something on my mind and is never judgmental. I always feel better afterwards." The two women share stories about their lives and keep up-to-date on each other's families, which sometimes involves a phone call in between visits. Dot thanks The CareGivers for sending Joannie to her..."she fills a void in my life". Joannie's mother passed away a couple of year's ago and finds spending time with Dot helps fill a similar void in her own life. It takes a friend to be a friend...


